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## Adoption of 2014 Strategic Action Plan drives November Council meeting agenda

**Olympia** — On Nov. 19, the Washington Student Achievement Council will consider adopting the 2014 Strategic Action Plan. The plan includes recommendations to meet Washington's two statewide educational attainment goals for 2023:

- All adults in Washington, ages 25 to 44, will have a high school diploma or equivalent.
- At least 70 percent of Washington adults, ages 25 to 44, will have a postsecondary credential.

The 2014 Strategic Action Plan, which is intended to strengthen and align ongoing efforts that increase educational attainment in Washington State, includes recommendations aligned with the council's 2013 Roadmap Report.

The plan is scheduled to be delivered to the Legislature and Governor in early December.

The meeting agenda will also include presentations about successful student support programs from the College Success Foundation and the Puget Sound Coalition for College and Career Readiness. Additionally, the council will consider how the Affordability Interactive Model, developed in collaboration with Dr. Jim Fridley, can be used to understand affordability for all students and support investments in postsecondary education.

The meeting will take place from 8:30 a.m. to 2:45 p.m. in Tumwater. All <u>materials</u> will be available online the day of the meeting.
